

EGG BOX DAFFODILS

This is the ideal Easter group activity – quick to make, using low-cost materials and great to look at!

ENCOURAGES: Construction

STORE CUPBOARD

- Egg boxes
- White card
- Yellow paint & brush
- Green straws
- Pencil
- Scissors
- PVA glue
- Sticky tape

1 Draw a six petal flower shape onto white card and cut out. Use this as a template to draw around to create as many daffodils as you are planning to make.

2 Carefully cut out the egg box sections from the egg boxes.

3 To make each daffodil, paint one flower shape and one egg box section with yellow paint. Once dry, use PVA glue to attach the egg box section to the centre of the flower shape, pressing together for a few seconds to make sure they stick.

4 Using short pieces of sticky tape, attach a green straw to the back of each daffodil.

TIP

To save time you could cut the daffodil flower shapes from thin yellow card rather than paint them.



Collage Egg Card

Encourage children to use their imagination to come up with their favourite egg design.

ENCOURAGES: Imagination ★ Exploration of Materials

STORE CUPBOARD

- A4 sheets of coloured card
- A5 sheets of fun foam in a variety of colours
- Scraps of tissue paper, felt, card, pompoms, glitter etc., for decoration
- Felt-tip pens
- Scissors
- PVA glue

1 Fold an A4 sheet of coloured card in half to make a vertical blank greetings card.

2 Cut an egg shape from the coloured fun foam and stick it onto the front of the A4 folded card using PVA glue.

3 To decorate the egg, encourage the children to use whatever materials there are available. Shapes or patterns can be drawn in with felt pens.

SUPPLIERS

To save time, you can buy pre-cut foam egg shapes from stores such as HobbyCraft or online.
